The work done by IMPACT is relevant not only to the youth involved, but to the church and communities at large. Specifically, by

involving the youth in the mission, they get grounded in their faith. This helps to retain them in church, and keep them away from the evil influences of the world. IMPACT further helps to mentor and expose the youths, ultimately preparing them for leadership. Concerning helping the church, IMPACT has helped open over 25 churches across Zambia with over 5,000 new members baptised in the church. The movement further helps prepare vibrant preachers and leaders to take over the mantle. A number of our missionaries in the period under consideration have since joined pastoral ministry. At community level, IMPACT helps communities by teaching general health lifestyles, through conducting many health education programs. Through facilitation and recommendations, IMPACT, inconjunction with Eye Hospitals has helped restore sight to over 45 people.



Treatments for malaria, diarrhoea and other rural illnesses have been administered through its medical people. In addition, material



support in terms of food and clothing has been given to over 15,000 people in the rural communities. The Organization is also happy to note that through its preaching of the word, moral values have been inculcated in society.

I therefore wish to extend the Lord's blessings to the IMPACT Missionary Movement, as I encourage the young leadership of the movement never to tire in doing this noble work. 

ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The movement was restructured to make it more relevant to its members and souls to be reached on the ground. With the expansion of the movement, the current organization structure has made the movement more administratively organized and mission focused.

The Origins

The idea of IMPACT began in December 2007 after a team of 6 members from Lusaka Central SDA Church attended a conference on youth and community in Taiwan organised by the General Conference of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church with Pastor Joe Lubasi, the then youth Director of the Zambian Union Conference. The members were privileged to meet other missionaries who were doing exploits for God world over like the 1000MM Missionaries. Upon returning, three of the young people, thrilled by the event and inspired by the missionaries that they met in Taiwan, became resolutely ablaze with fire to do more for God. Having returned from Taiwan, they helped two of their friends that year to go for a mission to Asia and the team of 3 that remained in Zambia quickly convened and developed the concept, and came up with the name IMPACT. Two young men then, namely, Ntabeni Jere and Dr Ekin Simwatachela, initially coined the first version of the acronym of the name of IMPACT as "Inspiring Missionaries to Preach

the Advent of Christ Today". This was later refined to "Inspired Missionaries Proclaiming the Advent of Christ Today". Michael Likuluta was then tasked to develop the first version of a draft working paper of IMPACT, which was presented to Pastor Joe Lubasi as Youth Director of Zambia Union of the SDA Church for review. Pastor Lubasi then advised the group would need to start at the local church and grow to union Level. Thereafter, a document was presented to Lusaka Central Church Elders' Board, it was well received, deliberated on and approved.

The Church accepted IMPACT and on October 4, 2008, the movement was finally born and launched at Lusaka Central Seventh-Day Adventist Church and within two weeks of its formation, the Movement did its first mission in the outskirts of Lusaka in the Makeni Area. The first team to go on mission included (Hastings Phiri, Sihle Siyanagowa, Beene Siyamuzoka, Collins Kakaya, Katambi Bulawayo, Maureen

Mubita, Jane Mfugi, Geogina Fyakulilaya, Rabson, Chisanga Mutoloka, Ashley Mwenda, Jones Simamba, Elder James Banda and Michael Likuluta) with additional team of 5 from NAPS Zambia. This first mission was a step of faith as there was no money to help the missionaries. Food was provided by Elder Mweene Mwinga's family and Br Joseph Ngosa. Br Ashley Phiri bought the first Generator Set, PA system was borrowed from NAPS Zambia and all the missionaries contributed more for transport and logistics began the first mission. It was an intense two weeks of passionate service, and by the end of the two weeks, 23 souls were baptised. That first miracle of God providing for the mission sparked a realisation that God's presence was with IMPACT missionaries and brought a realisation that all future missions would happen by faith fuelled by personal sacrifices. The first lesson was the first orientation that helped IMPACT members not to depend on any structure for funding. IMPACT has since operated in the past 12 years using this self-reliant model and to date, they have never failed any mission they set their hearts upon to execute.

GUIDING VISION AND TENETS

The inspiration of the movement was driven by three convictions that have guided the vision of IMPACT

(i) We are to exist until the end:

IMPACT has enshrined it in their constitution that the dissolution of IMPACT will be at the second coming of Christ. This Long term vision has made IMPACT have a strategic focus in its plans and demands for longer term commitment from its Leadership. IMPACT is built to last, and whatever IMPACT does, it is not just for today or tomorrow, but for eternity.

(ii) We are to play a focal point in accomplishing his work:

With conviction and a purpose, IMPACT believe that they will play a significant part in the finishing of the work. That they are called, raised up and anointed to be an instrument destined to play a significant role in raising an army that will be used by God to finish the work.

(iii) The work will be completed in our generation:

The name IMPACT being an acronym (Inspired Missionaries Proclaiming The Advent Of Christ Today), the "Today" in the acronym is not only a call to action in the present, but also an expression of belief that the work will be done in our generation. This gives the movement the present realisation of the imminent return of Christ, and present the need to prepare to meet God.

THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS

The "Cambridge seven" is the story of seven young men who shook their world in the 1880's in England. Having been brought up in wealthy families, and with high levels of intellectualism, they were some of the brightest and promising young men to graduate from Cambridge. Had they gone on to fulfil what most people expected of them, they would have been the Rockefellers, the Roosevelt's and Kennedy's of their time. However, their story is an amazing testimony of how God can lead different people's lives. On their graduation night from Cambridge, some of the wealthiest individuals and socialites of London had come to attend their graduation. They were all expecting a ceremony with pomp and splendour, which always characterised a Cambridge graduation, and were looking forward to the party that would follow.

However, when they went in to the auditorium, they were surprised to see one long table with stacks of Chinese bibles on them and these seven young men sitting behind the table dressed in simple Chinese

clothing. One by one, they stood up and gave their testimony on how God had led in their lives and how they felt called to give up their lives of wealth and honour and follow lifelong missionary work for Jesus Christ. In fact, by this graduation day, they had booked passage and were leaving for China the next morning by boat.

The audience was shocked and amazed at the sacrifices these young men were making and all the wealth and prestige they were giving up for such a humble task as was envisioned. Surely, such great lives could not be wasted on such an enterprise, which many people deemed unworthy. But the young men believed that God's service called for the brightest and best and they were willing to answer the call.



Because of their resolute determination, their amazing story crossed the ocean and made its way into various colleges and universities in America, and was largely responsible for the founding of the student volunteer

movement that would lead to the motto "The Gospel to all the world in this generation". This lit the fire for missions in the late 1800's, a fire which even the youth of the new SDA church then taped into.

The spirit of missions will never die. For it started with God himself, and runs through the blood of his son. Through which spilt on the cross and applied to all who believe in him. The same spirit raised apostles, prophets, saints and missionaries to propagate the gospel to the entire world with power. The spirit hovers from generation to generation, seeking whom it may possess. Such generations as the church of the reformers, era of Philadelphia Church-great generation of modern missionaries were possessed by the self-same spirit and the

outstanding results of their work remain immortalised on the pages on human history. The SDA pioneers, being possessed by the same spirit, laboured with the

kind of sacrifice that we cannot even begin to imagine. This sacrifice propelled the shaft of the first, second and third angel's messages which saw these messages and the church take the shape of global significance. The same spirit visited the African continent in recent times, and there was a and other sister youth missionaries movements across the continent such as (ALIVE, African Exodus, JAFA Afrique, Mission Cohot, COME etc). Whether this fire will continue to burn or not, is dependent on our generation. The spirit of missions will never stop, as the world plunges in deeper

mushrooming of missionary organisations across the continent from 2005- to date.

From Cape Town to Cairo, and from Ethiopia to the francophone countries of West Africa. It was this wind of missions that brought about the birth of IMPACT,

HISTORY

They were ideas that most of the founding and early missionaries believed in, and to a large extent internalised and domesticated to the movement. Some of the ideals came in the form of adage, others inform of lifestyle and many more. With passing of age new members who share the ideals and similar beliefs have come to join the movement. Though members have changed with the passage of time but the ideals that have shaped the movement over time:

"Souls are Dying": Out of the concern for the dying souls, "the many going to Christ less graves" concept gave impetus to work hard, to exert energy, time and resources, and at times the young people risking their own lives for the salvation of others.

- Our action, behavior and philosophies, as well as methodologies of how missions are to be done, should be aligned to scripture. This extent of our alignment to scripture will determine our
- success or failure in mission and personal lives. The

product we sell to the world is the word of God, and thus should be understood and rightly divided and proclaimed with power to the world. We are guaranteed the Word of God will accomplish the purpose for which it is sent, and will not return void.

- Prayer: Prayer lifts the missionary to the throne room of the almighty, and affords divine communion that uplifts and transforms him. - Love, care and Service: All missionary efforts and actions should spring from Love; otherwise, our sacrifices are regarded as emanating from deluded enthusiasm and ambitious hypocrisy. Love is the form with which we touch every soul we reach, the essence of missions, the flowing gift we give to the world and in communion, we share with our fellow missionaries

- "It's not a sacrifice but a privilege": This ideal drove missionaries to give and not complain, to focus on the work of Christ and realise that none of us ever gave as much as God did in his son Jesus Christ. That no one suffers as much for the salvation of mortals as Christ did. This being the present reality, the missionaries are guided to think, behave and humble themselves, regardless of whatever befalls them in their personal lives or whilst on mission. This drove them to give and work without feeling entitled, but as a way of thankfully paying back to God a debt that they can truly never pay for what Christ did for them on the cross of Calvary.
- Served to save: A sense of responsibility rested upon the missionaries to realize that we are indebted to preach the gospel immediately it was received. This is because they realized that they had received the gospel not because they were special, but so that once having drunk from the fountain of life, they have the responsibility to become springs of life from whence the gospel would flow to the world.
- V Sense of Urgency: The missionaries realize they are living in the end time where to stand at the verge of time and eternity, and at the threshold of the crisis of all the ages. As such, in the little time left to share the gospel, they are a generation of missionaries with little time and bound responsibility compared to any other era. Hence they are to preach the gospel with urgency and power, unlike any other generation.

Mission in General

We understand mission to mean the divine outflow of love that uplifts man from sin to holiness. Mission is the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in word and action in order to reclaim the lost through the process of Conversion. It can therefore only be effectively done when the whole life of a missionary becomes one constant love sacrifice, every action a manifestation, and every word an utterance of love. We also reckon that this can only happen when the natural man is converted to be a spiritual one, through whom the miraculous power of the grace of God is made manifest to the world. After Conversion has been wrought in the life of a disciple, His life starts to flow out in service to all those around him. We understand to say that, primarily, our mission is not merely the dissemination of doctrine, but that through a Christ personified life, the Gospel is to spread in thought, word and action. The aim of preaching the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ is to reclaim and convert sinners, as it is only through conversation that the lost can be reconciled to God and be part of His Kingdom. The spiritual nature of the Gospel commission therefore demands that we place emphasis on conversion, and not numbers of baptism of people who accent to doctrine we believe in.

The cross reveals what it means to be dedicated to the mission of saving the lost. The cross reveals to us the ultimate cost of sin, and the extent to which each missionary may have to go in order to save the lost. At the Cross, as we see the son of God pouring out His life for the salvation of men, we realize the incalculable cost of the mission. The blood-stained path to Calvary teach all those who are to



which their devotion, dedication and sacrifice is required for the salvation of the lost. Whether we live in times of peace and prosperity, or in times of adversity and trial, the work of salvation demands the same sacrificial giving of ourselves in talents, energy, time, love, and heart to both God and man. Therefore, all those who have been called to be gospel workers with God, are called to a complete death to self, in the same manner as Christ died on the cross.

"How Shall we participate?" asks the Youths

The Role of Youthful workers in Finishing the Work

The movement focuses primarily on youthful messengers in finishing the Lord's work. This is in line with inspiration's message on the role that youth must play to this effect. In the book "Education", on p 127, Inspiration states: "With such an army of workers as our youth, rightly trained, might furnish, how soon, the message of a crucified, risen, and soon coming savior might be carried to the whole world." The movement therefore focuses on mobilizing youthful gospel workers, giving them practical and theoretical training of mission, seeking to unite them to form gospel armies, and finally deploying them to various mission fields. The Specific burden and Call of the Movement

The Call

We believe that the same way God calls individuals to specific posts of duty; he does the same with missionary movements. God calls individuals in different ways, through placing a burden, providential leading, using the spiritual gifts or talents bestowed, and various circumstances that require a response from His children, and at times he calls directly as he did to Moses. God's ways for dealing with His people cannot all be listed here. As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are God's ways higher than our ways (Is 55:8-9). Suffice to say that we need to depend on divine wisdom to show us the way that we may walk in it.

Our specific Call

We believe God has called us by placing a special burden for mission, driven by the following factors;

- The existence of regions and people groups who have not been reached with the gospel,
- Specific calls through his providential leading off, and
- The need to access places that are populous and full of wickedness.
- To Un-entered areas and unreached people groups

As Paul put it, "Yea, so have I strived to preach the gospel, not where Christ was named, lest I should build upon another man's foundation" Romans 15:20. This is by far the is

the most defining factor of our special calling as a ministry. The burden that the Lord has placed upon us as a movement is to focus our energy and resources where there is greater need for the gospel, and where other gospel workers have little presence. By having our specific niche, we do not undermine other callings that the Lord has placed upon other individuals and movements, but we have simply responded to the specific burden placed upon us.

Providential Leadings an important lesson to consider in mission work is made mention in passing, in the 16th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, verses six through nine. Though Paul was equipped, willing and excited to take the gospel message to the people of Asia who had it not, the Bible records that he and his companions were forbidden by the

Holy



Ghost to preach the word in Asia. Prompted once more by his desire to bring salvation to a dying people, he attempted to go into Bithynia as he passed by Mysia. He was an able missionary for God, a willing servant who had put himself at God's disposal and yet, the Spirit suffered them not. It was in a vision

given him in the night that Paul received his marching orders from God: Go into Macedonia and help the brethren there. It is in that night vision that God directed Paul to the specific mission field that He had prepared for them in His divine providence. Paul's response to God's clearly outlined map was almost instantaneous for, immediately (they) endeavored to go into Macedonia. From this we learn that the need of the people, coupled with their willingness and readiness to receive the Word motivate the call.

Populous Places and High Levels of Wickedness

In Jonah's case also, it is the Lord who speaks to Him to arise and go to Nineveh. The impetus in this case was the high levels of wickedness in Nineveh. Another reason for choosing a particular mission field in which to labor is the absence of the Word of God – which often manifests itself by abounding sin and wickedness (Jonah 1:1; 4:11). The guiding principle in selecting a field is God's leading. Neither physical proximity nor remoteness, neither beautiful sceneries nor harsh natural conditions, neither the notoriety gained due to prevailing evils nor the desire to impress with presumptuous zeal, should be the primary reason for setting out on a journey to labor in any corner of God's vast vineyard. It is God's Work and His plan of salvation. We are but tools in God's hands to bring His good news to His children. He does the calling and we respond by going for His every. The movement carried out a cross section survey using a structured questionnaire on its members and some of the notable factors that may have led to growth and survival of the movement over the years are captured below based on individuals' responses:



missions in excess of 30 with local and international partners and have reached over 10,000 individuals who came for health screens and minor treatments. One other major success was the mission operation were IMPACT sponsored a medical mission with Lusaka eye hospital were 70 patients with eye

complications were operated on Chilubi Island and 45 had their eyesight restored. The movement has also done a lot of prison ministries and radio programs through its chapters and have reached 1,200 of people through this ministry and led many to the patery grave of baptism. The Movement

has also used social media to reach out and is running a youtube channel where the sermons that are preached Mission the Empowerment conferences broadcasted. IMPACT also had a partnership with life destiny TV in 2016 were the series of sermons MEC were preached at the broadcasted by the TV stations covering 25 countries.

GWEMBE AID

Gwembe aid is one of many community services conducted by the Movement. This is inline with philosophy of the movement and clearly inshrine in the strategic plan of the movement.

Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, [and] to keep himself unspotted from the world.

James 1:27



The Gwembe Aid Project was a 'response program' by IMPACT to the challenges that Zambia has been facing. It was constituted last year when Zambia had an uneven distribution of the rainfall pattern in the 2018/2019 season owing to climate change. As a result, certain parts of the country suffered unprecedented spells of drought which resulted in poor agricultural outputs, and food crises in about 52 districts. Some of the worst hit districts were Gwembe Valley and Shan'gombo. In line with its philosophy to carry out its operations in the neediest communities, IMPACT settled on Gwembe Valley as its priority choice.

The movement consulted with the Disaster Mitigation and Management Unit (DMMU) to ascertain whether indeed Gwembe Valley was one of the most hit. After being informed by DMMU that it indeed qualified to receive aid, a team was sent on the ground in Gwembe to conduct a



fact-finding mission and inquiry with local Gwembe District council, acting District Commissioner and other stakeholders of the community such as church leaders.

After confirmation were given, and actual visits were made to the villages. The team interacted with those affected by hunger and inquiries were made as to what form of help they needed. Later, a committee conducting fundraising programs from September to 15th November, 2019 was instituted.

The Gwembe Aid project was run under the theme "Together We Can". As indicated in the theme, the project aimed at involving as many individuals, companies, groups and churches as possible to play a part in being a solution to the challenges the country is facing such as the food crisis. The other reason the project was undertaken was to respond with a heart to the needs of Zambians in the spirit of Ubuntu and Christianity. The project was also organized to complement the many laudable efforts that

the government is making to combat the effects of climate change in relation to food security in the country. What has been donated and how many people have benefited? The target was to support 1,000 families with a food basket compsisting of a 25kg bag of mealie meal and 5kg of beans. The locals had also indicated that there was also need for seed for planting for the coming rainy season but due to time and financial constraints, the movement agreed to prioritize the support of the communities with immediate food for consumption as some of them indicated that they were so hungry they did not have strength to even walk and work. At the end of the fundraising project, the movement managed to fundraise some money which was used to support 700 families. The sites that were chosen to be supported included Bondo, Nyangwe, Luumbo. A total of 57 villages and 700 families were assisted, bringing the total number of beneficiaries for the households to 6.952 people. The allocation for each area was as follows: 250 families in Bondo, 250 in Luumbo, and 200 families in Nyangwe. Upon learning that some locals had not had food for over 3 days after travelling for as far as 15km on empty stomachs, volunteers organized a feeding program on a daily basis for three days in each of the three areas, where a total of 950 families were fed. The total funds spent to support the families amounted to ZMW 125,000 (US\$ 10,000).

Worship service with the villagers at Nyangwe Primary School The distribution program for the Gwembe Project ran from Thursday, 21st to 23rd Saturday November 2019. Bondo was visited on Thursday while Luumbo and Nyangwe were visited on Friday and Saturday respectively. The program started early in the morning. As soon as the villagers arrived at the three sites from various villages to receive the food stuff and feeding program, they were welcomed after which a number of presentations on

health and consolation messages weregiven. They were then put in groups of ten to be given food to eat. The feeding program was then followed by the distribution of food as directed by the appointees of the Disaster

Management Committee in Gwembe.



The Gwembe Aid Project was supported by various companies, churches, individuals, youth groups, women groups, men groups, and employee groups from

various organizations. The contributions flowed from friends and families from both within and abroad. About 4 companies participated, whereas the government rendered support in form of transport to ferry the donations from Lusaka to Gwembe through the DMMU Office. Over 102 individuals played a part.

IMPACT's main role was to create a platform and organize the project. The project financing was indeed a collaboration of effort from various stakeholders. Indeed, when we come together to accomplish a cause, we can do much as a people. It is with gratitude that we thank all the parties that played a part in alleviating pain in the lives of the Gwembe people and putting a smile on their faces.


























IMPACT NETWORK

South Africa in collaboration with sister movements in the countries where these were held. IMPACT has also attended Mission Empowerment Conferences in Nigeria as well as GYC in the United States of America. It is also great to know that IMPACT initiative was born with the founding members of the group attending a similar conference on youth and community service in Taiwan, which was organized by the Youth Department of General Conference

of the Seventh-day Adventist church.

The Mission Empowerment Conferences are organized to connect young people from all over the world for the purposes of revival and reformation and Mission. It is a platform that helps young people get a sense of belonging to the Adventist Church in the sense of Mission and reaffirming the

Report Overview

Below are the synapsis of each conference.

MEC 2016

The Mission Empowerment Conference 2016 (the "Conference") was planned and executed by IMPACT Missionary Movement in conjunction with Seventh-Day Adventists Student Missionaries (SASM) and Students Missionaries Movement



(STuMM). The conference took place from 1-5 July 2016 at the New Government Complex and NIPA Conference Centre, The Theme for the Conference was; COME UP HIGHER. The conference was led by 15 speakers of which 12 led different seminars focused primarily on missions. The conference was attended by an average of 780 delegates with maximum attendance on Sabbath reaching 1,000. The delegates at the conference represented 15 countries and of 4 continents. At the End of the Conference 18 precious souls were baptized. The Conference was followed by a mission which was organized for the delegates and was attended by 32 missionaries. A further 27 Souls were baptized bringing the total number of baptisms to 45.

MEC 2018



The Mission Empowerment Conference 2018 (the "Conference") was planned and executed by the Movement in conjunction with Seventh-day Adventists Student Missionaries (SASM) and Students Missionaries Movement (Stu-MM) of Zambia. The conference took place from the 29th of June-3rd of July, 2018, at NIPA Conference Centre. The theme

for the Conference was 'To the ends of the earth, 'which was re-echoed by the 14 speakers, of which 10 led different seminars focused primarily on missions. The Conference was attended by an average of 325 delegates with maximum attendance on Sabbath reaching 800. The delegates at the conference represented 8 countries and 3 continents. At the end of the Conference 2 precious souls were baptized.



The Conference was then followed by a mission which was organized for the delegates and was attended by 52 missionaries. A further 58 Souls were baptized during this mission, bringing the total number of baptisms to 60.

MEC 2020

The Mission Empowerment Conference 2020 (the "Conference") was planned by the Movement in conjunction with other missionary movements and supporting ministris of the Seventh-day Adventsit. The conference was scheduled to place between

3-7 July 2020 at Chrisma Hotel in Livingstone City. The Theme for the Conference was; "*Ready, steady*". The conference was planned to have 14 speakers, scheduled to leadout 11 different seminars focused on missions and evangelism in general. The conference was projected to be attended by 1,200 from different countries and mission groups. The conference was supposed to followed by the post mission to



Zimbabwe. Due to the outbreak and subsequent spread of Covid-19, the conference was posted to 2-6 July, 2021. All other details remain the same expect the costs of the event.



SASM meets IMPACT

Luangwa Mission- Zambia

Sept-October 2015

This was my life changing experience, the 13th of September-4th October.

While at home in Choma, I received a call from a friend I had been with on other missions in another missionary group.

I am currently a member of the Seventh-Day Adventist Student Missionaries (SASM) at the University of Zambia. I am also a member of IMPACT. At the time of this mission, I hadn't yet joined IMPACT, but a friend who happens to be a member informed me that IMPACT would be going on mission on for 3 weeks.

I had to move to Lusaka (our meeting point) on the Friday prior to our departure date. Of the group of 13 that was going on mission, I only recognised 3 faces which meant selflessly making new friends. The team comprised of 10 males and 3 females.

A few things discouraged during this trip. We started off very late (01:00 pm) from scheduled time (07:00am). This was so because the transport was a public one, we had to wait for it to get full before we could leave. The journey was not comfortable, the luggage was all over, about and on our laps.

I was seriously tempted to leave and get back home to my comforts surrounded by people I know and love, but I was reminded that this was God's calling and this was His business and He does not promise us a smooth ride nor comforts.

We reached quite late (07:00pm) to the first camp site, Mphuka village. The Lord was most gracious to grant travelling mercies.

After a wearisome journey we had supper that night and slept on mats that night.

On the first day, we split into 3 teams. Two groups had four members each sharing the ladies and one had five members, males only of which I was part of.

As we waited for further transportation to where we were to camp (Mangelengele village) we had to lodge at miss Moonga's place who really encouraged us to pray and to be fearless. She mentioned to say in that place there had a lot of spiritualism even among church members.

When we got to our site, we had great challenges. For example, in our sleeping booths, we were visited by snakes and scorpions and daily the mosquitos. We would have serious problems with the PA system, one of the equipment

would blow up. The place is seriously too hot, could hardly keep awake in the day. The heat highly made us drowsy. But by prayer and trust in the Lord we overcame.

The people in the community were highly receptive as we went for door to door witnessing conducting Bible studies and inviting the people to attend the evening service.

In the first week, one of our members had to preach, Elder Arnold Sikazwe. The attendance from the community was not so pleasing or as expected. Until in the third week when we were advised prior to the evening service to play some videos through the projector. The attendance drastically increased.


Personally, the experience was life changing, in the middle of a place I have never been before with total strangers I had to trust with my life in sharing everything.

A Simple Prayer of Faith

This testimony brings along mixed feelings. It causes me to smile, cry, tremble, and be courageous. At the thought that God still uses saved sinners like me to still set the captives free, my heart is humbled and all my self-sufficiency forsaken.

2nd – 14th November 2014, I was on an official mission with work to the Northern part of Namibia.

The first week of the mission went well. On Sunday November 9, we proceeded to the second region. I had not made any accommodation arrangements in that town. I had an option to go lodge or stay in a hotel, but before I could make any decision I prayed and asked for God's will to be done. After I had prayed I called one of my friends in the area where I was, to ask if she knew anyone who could help me with accommodation where I was going.

Unfortunately, or fortunately she also did not know anyone in that area apart from the district Pastor. She gave me the pastor's number, I asked him if he could assist me with accommodation for one week. He said he had one open room that I could use.

When I arrived at the Pastors house I found a young girl who looked almost 14 years old sleeping in the living room, later I was told she was a 26-year-old. After a few minutes the young lady woke up, she appeared mentally disturbed and sick. She had been dumb (couldn't speak) for 3 days, by writing she asked the pastor who I was and told him that she didn't like me. She then told the Pastor to ask me to leave the house but the Pastor told me not to mind her and that she was not well.

Around 18:00hours the Pastor told me that they normally have prayers every day in the evening at his house and asked me to prepare myself for the prayer session. He further told me that the young lady he was staying with was demon possessed ever since she was in Grade 5. She completed her high school, went to University for four years, and she was working.

In May 2014 she had to stop working because the demonic manifestations where becoming more frequent, she was not eating so her body became very weak and she was not productive at work anymore. Since then, church members had been meeting at the Pastor's house praying for her every day for almost 7 months.

After I had finished talking with the pastor people started arriving, we started with the song service and she suddenly started talking. She would laugh and make fun of the hymns and their meaning, requesting certain hymns to be sang saying they were her favorite songs. When we sang certain hymns, she would scream and make a loud noise asking us not to sing those hymns, that they were troubling her soul. But, we continued singing, praying and reading the word.

At the end of the prayer session we made a circle and had a chain of prayers. By that time, she was lying on the floor making terrible noises with a lot of white foam coming out of her mouth. Before my turn to pray, I asked God to teach me how to pray and what to pray for. I remember my short prayer that night, one of the things I asked God to do was to completely heal and deliver this weary soul in 7 days, referring back to the creation week.

Before I retired to sleep that night, I remembered Mark 9:29, so I decided to fast the next day. At the breaking of my fast that evening as we gathered for prayers, may body became

so tired to the point that I couldn't finish the session. I asked the brethren if I could offer a prayer and retire to bed because may body felt very tired. I prayed another short prayer thanking God for what He was about to do, then I went to bed.

That night as the saints continued praying and praising God, the Young lady was delivered. The next morning, I did not see her before I went out because she was sound asleep. In the evening when I came back home, I saw a beautiful young lady standing in the door way and she welcomed me in the house. After I had settled she asked the Pastor who I was and that she had not seen me before. The pastor told her that I had been staying with them the past two days but she couldn't remember anything. The Pastor told me she had been asking where they could get a lot of water so that she could get baptized. She said she remembered a Man who was always with her telling her that when she comes back she must get baptized under water.

She also kept saying that she knew that in seven days she will be completely healed. On the first day she remembered her name and that she was in grade 5. She also remembered

her mother and she recognized her when she came for prayers that evening. After a long 12 years of bondage, mother and daughter embraced as though one had gone on a long 12 years journey.

To cut the long story short she remembered that she was in high school, she went to university, she was working, and the type of job she was doing. By the seventh day she had her entire life back in place and completely healed.



When I came back from work Thursday evening, she ran to me and told me she wanted to tell me something. I settled and we sat down to talk, she looked at me straight in my face and told me I look like someone she knows, then she told me something that brought me to tears. She told me of the sufferings she went through in the spiritual world, how she was being starved and deserted by everyone apart from the few people who were praying for her who she referred to as angels.

She said these angels had been praying for her for a very long time and that they had become weary and were all ready to give up on her. When suddenly another angel appeared and encouraged the other angels not to give up yet but that God was about to do something. She further said the angel that came to encourage the other angels prayed and asked God to deliver her and heal her completely in seven days. The Man who was always by her side accepted the angel's idea of healing her in seven days. She looked at me again and excitedly she told me that I look exactly like that angel that prayed for her healing in seven days when everyone else was ready to give up on her and

that she believed that I was an angel sent to her from God.

By this time my heart had sunk in humility and I was sobbing, just the thought that God can still use a sinner like me to bring hope and life, is unfathomable. I still talk to the lady, Aino, and she tells me she is as fine as never before.

May the Good Lord continue using us where ever He desires, as He humbles us

We didn't have much luggage so we were on our way to the island in no time. I was terrified because I could not see any land where we were heading and I didn't know how to swim either.

A few minutes later, the boat started swaying from the left to the right and I started to wonder if that too was normal; before we realised, we were caught in a storm and we could not turn back nor head for the island. We all knew we were in trouble but still hoped the owner of the boat would tell us i it was gonna be fine. He however told us what we didn't want to hear. People in the boat started praying whilst others cried and the storm only grew worse. It was then I realized my fear had been replaced by peace.

A man sitting next me asked me who I was and I told him I was a student missionary. At this point I was wondering if the man thought I was like Jonah. He then turned and told his wife we were gonna be OK because God was with me. I wasn't sure if OK meant surviving the storm but heart was at peace beyond human understanding.

Arusha - Tanzania

In July 2012, I was in Arusha Tanzania, doing follow up work after the international GYC inter-mission. I focused on baptised members at nearby schools and preached at a high school.

One teacher was concerned about a particular student, Helen. She had a reputation of being suicidal and "weird". I started talking to her and gradually we became friends, some students didn't take my relationship with her well. One of the boys asked why I was friends with her and that he didn't like my association with her "kind". With time, Helen opened up about growing up in a broken home, and her father's "other" relationships.

There was one particular relationship that really got to her. One of her father's girlfriend's threatened to make Helen's life hell and because of Helen, the father ended his relationship with her.

From that day, a strange woman would appear to Helen. This scary out of a horror movie black as coal Being would appear to her and threaten to kill her parents if she disobeyed her orders.

Three times, Helen tried to kill herself so she could escape that being. Finally, after her suicide attempts, she was expelled from that school. She was sent to the school I was doing follow up on. Helen had been there for two terms and she had attempted to kill herself twice already. The students didn't like her, they thought she was doing this to get attention.

One day the very creature appeared in broad day light, and she was terrified. It told her not to tell anyone about what she says, otherwise, it would kill her and the person who knows about it. She cried and I hugged her. I knew that this was a spiritual battle. I was scared too, for her and for me. I didn't know what to tell her. So, I was inspired to tell her that it will not kill her or me that night, or ever.

I spent that night in prayer, I asked the Hatoongo sisters (IMPACT Zambia) to pray with me and a handful of missionaries around th world, Zimbabwe (Nompy), Kenya, Zambia, America and Namibia. The following day, some missionaries fasted with me.

I was anxious though, I didn't doubt God, I didn't know if Helen was okay. As soon as I got time I ran down to the school to check on her. I was sooooooo relieved to see her alive, I knew God was amazingly faithful. She told me she slept like a baby.

We became close. Then sadly my father got sick, I told Helen about my trip then I rushed to Zimbabwe. My father died and a few days after the funeral I went back to Tanzania. I was anxious to see Helen but school kept me busy for a while. I had enrolled as a theology student.

As soon I got time I went to see her and she gave me an update. She had recently tried to kill herself. This time, she was convinced this creature had poisoned her. I believed her, it was appearing more frequently. My heart sunk, because I felt responsible. I had stopped praying for her. She blamed my absence for its reappearing too.

I realised she didn't know how to pray. So that day, I asked her to tell God how she felt. It's the sincerest prayer I have ever heard. After she prayed then I prayed and it never appeared again.

Three lessons from this experience for me:

- 1. Prayerfully believe what a client tells you no matter how absurd it is
- 2. United prayer is amazing and that God answers prayers personally
- 3. No matter how distracted you are, don't stop praying for your clients

The year 2010 rings a bell of the first FIFA world cup tournament ever to be hosted on the African soil in South Africa. For me this also invokes sobering memories.

Earlier that year I received a message from IMPACT publicity Nasilele now Mrs Muungo that I had been selected to represent IMPACT Zambia at a co-joint mission cohort in South Africa. I was only a third year Theology student then at Rusangu University. The message clearly indicated that this international mission was fully funded for and all that was needed was my availability. Am sure you can imagine how excited I was to be visiting the magnificence of South Africa for the first time.

Anxiety deprived me of my sleep as anticipation for the departure grew.

The day came, it was a thursday in Lusaka, we were eight in number; Beene Siamuzoka, Lovemore Cheelo, Lembe, Collins, Micheal, Mapiki, Radebe, Miyanda Sianagowa and myself. Marleen joined us later in the course of the mission as we departed for South Africa via Zambia's Chirundu border post with Zimbabwe. Traveling on an international mission for the first time to me painted everything bright and beautiful. Through the long chassis of coach windows, I admired every tree and mountain in view, including the green and brown grass. The sunset seemed to be so different from the other days. I composed short poems to immortalize my rich memories as we all sang songs and hymns. We worshipped, we laughed, we chatted and we prayed as the bus continued South Africa bound.

We travelled all night and slept in the bus in their garage in Harare while mechanics were fixing as a result of it breaking down every after a kilometer upon crossing into Zimbabwe.

While waiting for the timed bus going to South Africa, we occupied ourselves with group devotion and Bible studies right in the bus terminus. We also took time to tour the famous Harare. By mid-morning, Friday, we started off from Harare and arrived in South Africa in the early hours of Saturday.



My South African friend, Mudinda Mbevana upon hearing of our coming invited me to speak at their Acacia church in Pretoria. It was youth day at their church. He was there by 8 AM to pick me not long after our arrival earlier that morning around 6 AM. There was no time to rest leaving only time to bath and dress up. Thank God I had long prepared my sermon script. This was the beginning of duty in a foreign country.

As I spoke and interacted with the believers at Acacia church, I had loads to observe and learn; their culture, style of worship, lifestyle and much more. Little did I realize that the Lord was preparing me for something bigger to do in this great nation. Later that evening, it was confirmed that one of the speakers at the Convention, Steven Kigozi from Uganda, had his visa delayed and would not be coming. The organizers agreed on my name to be the replacement. Upon hearing this news, my lungs constricted and my breathing freaked. A shiver of retreat knocked my knees together.

You see, the other invited guest was Dr. Ron Du Preez from Michigan in the US. So my fear was that of sharing the same platform with a great orator of Dr. Du Preez's caliber. That was almost an impossibility to believe. Secondly, I also feared to preach at such a lofty forum. Remember that I was only invited to attend and not to preach, worse still in my mind I thought the assignment was just too big to fall on the shoulders of a mere theology student. I agreed and in-turn hid this awful feeling.

I preached for a week and alternated with Dr. Du Preez. For me what was important was not necessarily to speak and sound powerful or to keep up to the level of people's expectation but rather my prayer and solemn ambition to fulfill the purpose why God had chosen me.

I was comforted one evening after I finished speaking when a young man and lady walked to me to converse. The young man had been invited to attend our meeting by the same lady he was with. It was his first time to attend a religious gathering. He asked to for more lessons and counseling about the things I spoke on because he felt an urge within him to commit his life to the Lord.

I have come to believe that God can use anyone He so wishes to use as long as they are willing to cooperate with Him. God does not make a mistake. When he sends you it's

because He'll be with you? As the spirit of prophecy it. "His puts biddings and His enablings." The apostle Paul said, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

From Mutikinya, Kaoma (Western province of ZAMBIA)

The first mission I went on after I joined IMPACT was to Kaoma in December, 2012. We carried out this mission in an area called Mutikinya.

The team leader "one voice" of our group was Thuba. Who also happened to be my partner for door-to-door evangelism while in Mutikinya.

During our door-to-door visits, we took the same route every day. We met and prayed and had Bible studies with the people that we found at home in this village.

I remember there was one particular house where the owner was rarely at home. On the days that he was at home, he would not let us in to share the word of God with him. This made us sad of course, but we did not despair.

Two days before the end of our mission, as we carried out our door-to-door visits, the man of this seemingly unwelcoming house called us. Hope glimmered in our hearts and it showed in our haste as we walked towards his house. I remember his name was Nasilele. He sat us down and began to tell us what he thought of our visit to this village. Nasilele told us that if we ever thought he would listen to us, we would be lying to ourselves. He added that he had no interest in our beliefs and church and that he was a staunch member of his church who would not change any time soon.

This broke our hearts. He had called us all the way from our journey to deliver hope to many, only to discourage us and reaffirm his beliefs. We were so disturbed by what Nasilele had said to us.

That day when Thuba and I got back to the camp site, we went to our prayer spot (this was a shed under a tree that had a wooden bench where we prayed together every day for the people we ministered to during the mission). We discussed what Nasilele had said to us and took it to the Lord in prayer. Our prayer was that God would speak to him and reach out to him. That he would not give him peace or rest till he comes to full realization of the truth written in the Bible. With an AMEN we left Nasilele's case in God's hands.

The following day was the last day in the mission field. We went to say our good bye's and deliver our final messages in the area we had been frequenting during the two weeks. As we passed Nasilele's house, we heard him call us. We wondered what message he had to send us off. We braced ourselves and walked up to his house. He offered us seats and asked us a startling question. His question was: "Do you believe that God uses dreams to communicate with us?"

We told him we did and that not all dreams were from God but that God did use dreams to communicate with people in the Bible. We further referred to what the Bible states in Acts 2:17; In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams.

Nasilele then began to explain the dream he had the previous night after we left. He said he dreamt that God had told him the SDA church was the right church.

Nasilele then made a shocking confession. He said he was once an active member of the Seventh-day Adventist church but left. He said he knew this dream was God telling him he should return back to his faith. He then explained that he was currently in a high position at a church he attended on Sunday and that if he left, the people of this village (the majority belonging to the same church) would perceive him a deceiver.

The look on his face showed what grief he felt in his heart. He asked us how he could get back to the SDA church without disappointing the church he attended on Sunday, We explained how it does not matter what people will say about him if he truly obeyed God. All that mattered was his relationship with God and living out the Bible truth. After

some words of encouragement and Bible study with him, we said a prayer and went on our way.

When we got back to the camp site, we returned to our prayer spot and praised the Lord for his quick and accurate response to our prayer and plea.

What I learned during this mission is that God loves and wants to save all his children. Even the ones we deem stubborn. I also learned about the STRONG and

EFFICIENT power of prayer.

This was a miracle Thecla Chikuni and I witnessed on a mission we went on in 2010. I cannot remember his name so we will call him Luke for this testimony. This is a narrative from Luke.

My name is Luke. I am the first born of my mother and I have 2 brothers. We are all from different fathers but from the same mother.

When I was young, we stayed in Kitwe. One day, my mother's brother, who lived in Kitwe as well, got a job in an area called Chilubi Island in the Northern part of the country. He asked my mother if I could go with him, which she agreed to and I got a school transfer and moved to

Chilubi Island with my uncle. This journey was about 1000 km by road plus 5 hrs by boat.

When we finally arrived in Chilubi Island, we quickly settled down and adjusted to our new home. After staying there for some time, I missed my mother so much and I asked my uncle if I could go and visit her during the school holidays which he agreed to.

The holidays came and I was ready to go back to Kitwe for

my visit. Before I started my journey back home, I called my mother to inform her I was on my way. After I moved about half way through, I got a phone call that my mother had died. I was in shock, disbelief and full of grief. Non the less, I had to continue the journey. When I arrived in Kitwe, we had the funeral and a lot of people attended.

After the funeral, the father of my youngest brother left with him. My other brother was

taken by his father's relatives who said they would take care of him. As for me, my father wanted nothing to do with me. Fortunately, my uncle whom I moved with to Chilubi Island said he would still take care of me. I was grateful beyond measure.

Having experienced all this at a tender age, I developed a memory lapse. I would easily forget things I was told in a matter of seconds. This was hard for me as I couldn't focus at school with this problem. I didn't know what to do.

One day while I was at home, I heard a knock at the door. I opened the door to a young man and woman who greeted me and introduced themselves as Herris and Thecla. They explained that they were missionaries who came to Chilubi Island to carry out some mission work. They went on to ask



me if they could share the word of God with me. I agreed and we sat down as they shared the message they carried. At the end of their Bible study, they asked me if I understood what they preached. Miraculously, I could remember everything they told me. I was in shock as this had never happened before. In excitement, I told them about my trouble with short-term memory and how the problem started. They were excited with me and told me that it was the power of God at work.

Before they left my home, they invited me to attend Bible study lessons and a crusade they held at their mission campsite later that evening. This was new for me. I had no religion, no church and no belief. I did not even know how to pray.

So beginning that very evening, I started going for the Bible studies's and the crusade. They taught me about the Sabbath truth, Baptism, Second coming and many truths from the Bible. They would also pray with me after the Bible studies. My memory kept on improving and I realized prayers were being answered. I decided to join the Seventh Day Adventist Church and I got baptized on the 10th of July 2010. I praise God for the missionary's visit to Chilubi Island.

He was sentenced to 38 years of imprisonment with hard labor which later changed to death by hanging after serving 3 years of the imprisonment. They were carried 50 in number for hanging. There they were subjected to 7 days of death preparation without food or



any liquid to drink. On the day of execution, information reached the prison superiors that 5 of the 50 were innocent and Mr. Mazimba was one of them. After thorough investigations it was

discovered that Mr. Mazimba was not guilty because the man, with whom he fought, died of an accumulated liver problem due to his excessive intake of Kachasu (locally brewed strong & fermented wine).

Proven not guilty and released from prison, Mr. Mazimba rushed back home where he immediately learnt that both of his parents had died while he was in prison. The anguish and pain that fell upon his soul caused him to become a drunkard and careless man but God was still watching over him.

After listening to this ordeal, the missionaries took Mr. Mazimba through Romans chapter 8. There they encouraged him on how inseparable we are from God's love and that all things work for good in our lives. They reasoned with him from scripture and made an appeal to him to get baptized. Mr. Mazimba said a resounding yes to the call and chose to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. On 2nd January 2021, he got baptized along with other 61

people of mbala who decided to walk with Christ in the newness of Mr. Mazimba life. together with daughter (who is yet to be baptized) continues to congregate with the



believers at Zombe church in the Zombe village of Mbala. Martin K Chishimba

Testimony Zimbabwe

We conducted a two week mission campaign at an identified un-entered area called Cabatsha outside



Trinnance in Byo. It was successful, 15 souls were baptized, and 6 were pending. A branch was opened as it was left to Trinance church to continue nurturing.

We also had an IMPACT

medical missionary training, targeted mainly at IMPACT members. Training was successful though we did not manage to finish it all. The training was conducted by staff from Tetbury Farm in Chegutu. Only few IMPACT members attended, but more were nonmembers of which among them was a medical missionary group called Ezulu

Ministries which later helped us conduct a mini-health expo at Cabatsha again, which crowned a 2 week follow up campaign at the same place. 6 souls were baptized at the follow up campaign and 8 still needed follow up of which was left in the hands of Trinance church. Health messages from health talks and expo were gladly received.

It Is One Of Most Difficult Site

We arrived in at the Junction around 7am and we had to get on Taxis to get to Lubwe 25 kilometers from Samfya town. Lubwe is a strong catholic stronghold as they operate a full-fledged mission with



radio stations, school and hospital. Upon Luapula their conference assigning us to Lubwe, they told us how it has been one of their most difficult sites as the Catholics counteract the efforts of the church through their aggressive community support work they render to the people of Lubwe. When we arrived at the site, we were acquainted with the nature of the community we were going to be dealing with. We were alerted that there was a lot of drinking, smoking and other associated vices, besides that, the place was dominated by Roman Catholicism as it is there mission area. We would go for Evangelism around 11am because most people would be in their fields in the early hours of the morning. So during the earlier hours, we would have devotions, Bible studies and Prayer and Fasting programs. What really stood out for me were two particular experiences, the Crusade as well as the field experience. We

had totally no equipment that would be used for the Crusade so we thought we would not even have the Crusade, the way God Works! Amazingly we found an elder who provided what we needed for our Crusade to run successfully. At the end of the mission we had 26 people Baptized. Challenged by the Commitment of Other


